UPDATE ON CHURCH PROPERTY

Since the closure of our Church buildings for safety reasons on 30 January 2024, the process of decommissioning and putting the buildings up for sale has moved at a slow pace. I thought it therefore appropriate to let you know where we are at present.

Following the emergency closure (and given the fact that our buildings were scheduled for closure in 2025) the Kirk Session and Congregational Boards voted that the buildings should be permanently closed and put up for sale. This was intimated to Forth Valley and Clydesdale Presbytery in late February 2024.

Following a meeting between our Kirk Session and Presbytery Representatives in late July 2024, it was agreed that the buildings could be closed permanently and that the process of selling the buildings could move forward. This decision was raised and passed at the Presbytery meeting on 31 August 2024 and was approved by the Church of Scotland General Trustees on 10 September 2024.

The General Trustees are responsible for all matters relating to the sale of the premises and grounds. The buildings have been visited by the General Trustees Legal Team to survey the property and get the necessary information to put the buildings and land onto the market for sale. The timescales for the sale are unknown at present and will be dependent on interest shown by prospective buyers.


Once the site has been sold, legal and other costs incurred in the sales process will be deducted from monies obtained from the sale. 10% of the monies obtained from the sale will go into the Church of Scotland central funds to support the wider Church. The remainder of the monies raised will be put into a fund which can be used by our new union for property (and possibly mission) matters.

Whilst the legal work has been proceeding, there has also been significant practical work undertaken at the Church. Water, heating and gas supplies were cut off in February and March 2024 just leaving the electricity supply live to maintain the lighting, CCTV and intruder alarm systems in operation for the security of the building.

During August the building contents were removed leaving only a few items in place which we hope can be relocated to other churches. These include the two stained glass windows in the Church sanctuary, the Minister's and Elders' chairs, Communion table, baptism font, standing lectern and communion silver. Many other items within the

church such as tables, chairs, crockery and musical instruments were donated to others. In the end we required nine skips to remove the unwanted or unusable contents within the Church.

It was a monumental effort to clear the Church of its contents in just four weeks and would not have been possible with-

Getting to know you

Claire Johnston our magazine editor talking to Sandra MacKenzie

I'm not one for name dropping normally but did you know that we have two graduates of Cambridge University in our congregation?! I didn't either until I interviewed Claire for our magazine. And their names are CLAIRE and her husband MICHAEL! Those lights were well kept under a bushel!

Claire grew up in Huddersfield with her mum, a pharmacist, and her dad, an electrical engineer. Her granny played a big part in her life and introduced the young Claire to church.

Claire lived with her mum and dad until she was 18 when she went off to Cambridge to study Natural Sciences. It was while she was there that she met Michael who was also studying there.

"We probably wouldn't have met," said Claire, "as he was two years ahead of me but we both ended up at the same church."

It was also while she was studying that Claire found she had a call to be a nurse. She finished her degree and went off to London to do a post graduate qualification in nursing. Michael had moved meantime to work in Berkeley in Gloucestershire as an engineer in the Nuclear Industry.

"Michael and I did a lot of travelling," she remembers with a wry smile

Three weeks after she qualified as a nurse she and Michael returned to the church in Cambridge where they had met to get married. A romantic end to their courtship and a romantic start to their married life.

Claire commuted to Cardiff to begin her nursing career and they continued to live in Gloucestershire from 1994 to 1998.

Michael's job was relocated to East Kilbride in 1998. Claire got a job in The Victoria in Glasgow helping to implement evidence based clinical guidelines. This was a part time post and she worked in hospitals the rest of her working week.

Claire now works part time in the NHS with NHS 24. She enjoys working with the variety of callers.

When he saw the mess he went to bed for four hours before he phoned for advice!!!!! "She told me though that she felt fine," said Claire. "I made a call to one of the helplines we have access to as I was unsure what to suggest. I was a bit taken aback when the man I spoke to said, 'Are you kidding?'

"It turned out this was the second consecutive call he'd had about the very same issue. He thought it was one of his colleagues having a laugh!

"And you'd be surprised at the number of calls we get at the May Bank Holiday weekends," continued Claire, "when the sheep farmers are busy inoculating their sheep and manage to inoculate themselves at the same time. Although even I was a bit surprised when I got a call from a llama farmer who had done the same thing!"

Claire and Michael's daughter Sarah is currently studying in Durham on a post graduate course in Astrophysics and is very much involved in her local church there, helping children with additional support needs in a group called "The Sparklers".

I asked Claire what interests she and Michael have outside work. Michael is currently working on Nuclear decommissioning. She told me that they both enjoy reading and a visit or two to Murrayfield to watch the rugby.

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In September of this year Claire started working on a Royal School of Needlework Certificate in Technical Hand Embroidery.

She told me, "There are four modules to be covered and I'm on my first which is crewel work- stitching with wool on linen. There are three more: canvas work, silk shading and finally gold work."

She has five years to complete the modules but she hopes to do it in two. That's Claire!

The Murray Community Hub-

a South Parish outreach initiative

Since the closure of the South Parish Church Building in February, we have been working hard to ensure the continuation of the various community activities that we operate. We want to make sure that we continue to connect with and serve the people of The Murray, which presents a challenge with no building of our own.

We are very grateful to the congregations of East Kilbride that have been generous in coming to our aid, including the congregation of Claremont Parish, who have welcomed us with open arms for Sunday morning Worship and so many other activities. We have tried to keep our organisations within our neighbourhood where possible and they have now settled into their new homes. Our two Boys' Brigade Companies have now joined together to form the 2nd/7th East Kilbride Boys Brigade and seem to be thriving with the joint resources and activities.

South Parish Kirk Session appointed a steering group which meets regularly to guide our existing activities and to look at future opportunities for serving the people of The Murray. Some of us visited an initiative in Calderwood called 'The Kettle's On', operated jointly by Moncreiff Parish and Calderwood Baptist churches who together participate in

'Connected Calderwood'. We felt that having a similar activity in The Murray might help tackle the isolation that is felt by a lot of our residents, while giving us the space to connect with them. Through connecting, we can identify any gaps in service provision that might be met by existing groups or by something new.



St Mark's Episcopal Church, who have also been very welcoming, have agreed to let us operate 'The Murray Community Hub' in their hall every Tuesday from 1 to 3pm. We have been running for several weeks, providing bowls of soup, playing board games and just sitting chatting. We have been assisted with funding and expertise by the staff at 'Healthy & Active', a charity which forms part of the umbrella organisation, 'Connected East Kilbride'.

God Will Make a Way

Since our church building was closed earlier in the year, we have been waiting to see what the future will bring once the presbytery plan has been implemented. As I write this we are still seeking a way forward and a hymn we used to sing in the South Parish keeps coming into my mind. That hymn is 'God will make a way', written by Don Moen.

I decided to look into the background of the hymn.

Don's sister-in-law and her husband, Craig and Susan Phelps, were involved in a car accident during a ski trip they were taking with their four children from their home in Oklahoma. An 18 wheeler truck hit their van with such force that all the children were thrown out. Three of the children were badly injured but their son, Jeremy, was found lying by a nearby fence. He was already dead, as his neck had been broken.

The family asked Don to sing at the funeral. As he sat on the plane travelling to the funeral, wondering what he should say to them, he began to read in the book of Isaiah. His eyes went to chapter 43, verse 19, '... I will even make a way in the wilderness, and rivers in the desert.' Instantly, the Lord gave him a song to sing to them. He sketched it out on a legal pad, intending to sing it at the funeral. However, they had already planned to ask him to sing another song, so he sang their request instead.

After the funeral, he was sitting with them, holding them in his arms. He cried with them, and through his tears he said, 'The Lord gave me a song for you.' And he began singing...

In our community and beyond.




